Assignment #2 (Optional)

So, we recommend that you follow the news. Be sure to pay particular attention to the political news - What is Congress doing/not doing? What decisions did the Supreme Court hand down? What is going on with the President/the upcoming primary election? What international issues dominated the news? We will have time to discuss current events from the summer during the first week back in August.

You may follow the news in whatever way works for you, but we recommend one (or more) of the following:

• **Read the paper.** Please be sure it is a credible source. We recommend the New York Times https://www.nytimes.com/ or the Washington Post https://www.washingtonpost.com. You should have free, unlimited access to the NY Times as a student at Oceana. Please let us know if you are unable to access it for free.

Listen to podcasts. There are short, daily podcasts that cover much of what is going on. They are free and you can listen to them on a smartphone or a computer. We recommend the following:
